

Snippets from Recent Club Programs

December 7 - Dr. Michael Kuhn, Director, U.S. Pork Technical Services

Michael Kuhn (PhD in Veterinary Medicine) spoke to club members about the changes to the U.S. pork industry over the past 10 years, and the improved quality and notional values of pork. Pigs now are now being raised in humane conditions in facilities that have a reduced carbon footprint. The gestation period for piglets is 114 days, after which they put in automated nursing areas to get specialized food for optimum growth (but no growth hormones). Piglets are then sent to market with an average weight of 280 pounds. The typical sow today produces 4000 pounds of piglets compared to 1500 pounds a decade ago. New industry standards starting in 2016 require a licensed veterinarian



determine what goes into the pigs' diet. Also, pig production facilities must install controlled-access entry doors to prevent carrying of diseases into the pig feeding areas by visitors and non-staff personnel. Regarding the nutritional aspects of pork, today's pork at the supermarket has 16 percent less fat and 27 percent less saturated fat than pork in 1991, and has a "Healthy Heart" rating slightly below chicken.

December 14 - Doug Yeiser, President/CEO of Foothills United Way

Doug has led nonprofit development and technology initiatives in local, regional and global communities for over 25 years, and since returning to Boulder in 2013, he is transforming Foothills United Way's work to foster and fund collaborative initiatives in Boulder County. A major project of Foothills United Way has been to coordinate relief and recovery efforts from the devasting Boulder-area floods of September, 2013. Doug initiated the Foothills Flood Relief Fund, a partnership that raised \$5.1 million for local flood recovery; and helped organize, operate and provide fiscal sponsorship for the Long-Term Flood Recovery Group. Looking ahead to the future, Foothills



United Way has set its priorities on strengthening families for early childhood success, and achieveing affordable housing in the Boulder area. Instead of United Way supporting some 70 programs/missions as in the pst, it will seek to reward collective efforts where multiple partners work together towards a common purpose. Current initiatives include -- Personal Investment Enterprise (PIE), Adult Homeless Collaborative, Volunteer Connection Funders Collaborative, and Boulder County VOAD (Voluntary Organizations Active in Disasters.
